While battling cancer, the COVID-19 Pandemic hit, which meant restricted visitation during April's chemotherapy treatments.

"It was a very frightening time in our lives, but the McLeod Cancer Center staff always treated me first class," shares April. "I did not feel like a cancer patient when I was there, and I was always met with hugs."

Nearly a year later, April was able to ring the bell as she finished her last radiation treatment in December. She commends the wonderful nurses and physicians who worked together.

Inspired by your generosity, PAC donates their annual dues to fund programs which help patients treated at McLeod Health.

Scott Mitchell, PAC Chair, explains, "Our members are so moved by the many generous donors to the McLeod Foundation that we wanted to use our annual dues to also help patients."

This year, they learned from Dr. Eva Rzucidlo, Medical Director of Vascular Services for McLeod Regional Medical Center and the McLeod Vein Center, of the countless challenges that her patients with vascular disease. face. While some are blessed with the means to afford personal supplies as needed, many struggle to afford essential items, such as compression socks.

Often, patients seen in the vascular office are instructed to wear specialized compression socks to aid with their illness and to alleviate their symptoms.

These socks not only help with pain relief, but also improve blood flow to the legs, which is important for a patient struggling with vascular issues.

For many patients, these socks are vital for their recovery but financially out of reach. These specialized socks can run nearly \$100 per pair, making it difficult for some to afford -- especially if multiple pairs are needed.

After personally seeing many patients going without these socks, Dr. Rzucidlo approached the McLeod Foundation.

Upon hearing the request and learning of the profound impact it would have on this group of patients, PAC members were moved to provide the funding to jumpstart this initiative.

"She shared that she was here alone with her sister. Her husband had to return home to work and take care of their other child. They were relieved to be able to stay safely, comfortably and conveniently in The Guest House at McLeod. I asked her if I could bring her some meals to help make her stay a little easier. She was very appreciative," explains Corey.

Following this experience, Corey learned that the Guest House is funded entirely by generous donors like you and is a special haven for families of McLeod patients especially young parents of NICU infants.

Corey had started a business, Convenient Crockpot Creations, following the birth of her child. As it grew, she often shared her creations with families struggling with health challenges. She had been praying for guidance to find a more consistent way to help others through her work.

With his diagnosis of head and neck cancer came an introduction to an extremely limited diet. He could no longer tolerate the foods he once enjoyed. With the expenses of frequent treatments and visits to his physician, Bruce also could not afford the food meant to nourish his body during his cancer fight.

A HOPE Fund Coordinator made possible by HOPE Fund donors ensures a caring individual is on hand each day to assist patients with their individualized needs. Our coordinator, Sarah Beth Averette, reviewed different types of assistance available with Bruce and his wife.
