


DEEP BRAIN STIMULATION TREATMENT FOR MOVEMENT DISORDERS

PARKINSON'S DISEASE MEDICATIONS CAN ONLY GO SO FAR

When medication alone is no longer enough, deep brain stimulation (DBS) can help. A modestly sized medical device is typically implanted just under the skin in the chest and sends electrical impulses to the brain via insulated wires called leads or electrodes.

DBS CAN:

Help reduce the primary motor symptoms of Parkinson's disease:

- Tremors
- Bradykinesia
- Rigidity

Reduce medication complications:

- Motor fluctuations (or wearing off)
- Dyskinesia

Potentially slow the progression of some Parkinson's disease symptoms.

DBS is covered by most major insurances, including Medicare.
